Determination, adaptability, resilience, partnerships and **kindness** are themes that underpinned our 2020/21 year.

While Covid-19 undoubtedly changed the world as we all knew it, we stood strong and maintained our commitment not



just to children and young people, but to their families and the **communities** we work within as well. During some really difficult times our **support was unfaltering** as we worked to ensure **no child, young person or family was left without help**.

As an organisation, a sector and individuals we take **great pride** in what we **achieved together** and this report highlights some of our collective **accomplishments** during a year that challenged us all.

Children and young people's home environment, engagement in their wider community and education all have a significant impact on their personal development, growth and futures.

Yet in 2020, as the world went into lockdown, children and young people's ability to **engage positively** in each area diminished. Already vulnerable children, young people and their families became significantly more vulnerable as support services were forced into near shutdown to slow the spread of infection, protect the NHS and save lives. Already strained home environments became more so, as families struggled with furlough and job losses; energy and food bills soared as families were confined to their houses; young people didn't have access to technology to stay connected to friends and complete school work from home; and traditional support networks crumbled for families. Children and young people became 'hidden in plain

sight'.



Through planned early intervention and in times of crisis. we are always there for children and young people, and we firmly believe partnership work is central to achieving the best outcomes. In a year like no other, and as we progress further forwards into 'recovery',

we are incredibly **proud** to reflect on how our organisation, our staff team, our partners and the voluntary sector **pulled together** to **respond collectively** to one of the biggest challenges we have faced together.







I took a sibling group to **Teyfant road** yesterday and I just want to say the workers Beckv and Sarah were **AMAZING**. The children's mum has been really unwell and 2 hours at the playground yesterday was exactly what the kids needed. Unfortunately their mum passed away last night but they have already contacted me saying they still want to **go back** to the **playground** next week. Becky and Sarah were just so fantastic and I really can't sing their praises enough - the kids told me they had the time of their lives and really enjoyed all the arts, crafts and cooking their own lunch - I also had the best time running around with them playing hide and seek - they can't wait to go back! LPW Independent School

LPW Independent School **re-engages young people** with their **education**. We provide a **safe**, **supportive** and **ambitious** learning environment that **inspires positive outcomes** and **personal growth**. We work with young people to support them to develop their sense of responsibility, **respect for self** and others. We create a sense of community that recognises and **celebrates diversity**.



Determination

Our LPW 'Independent School' status meant that during lockdowns we weren't eligible for government support like technology and supermarket food vouchers. In fact our status meant we were compared to private schools such as Eton and Harrow, which we are clearly a world apart from. Our staff team worked **tirelessly** to secure emergency support for young people which enabled us to provide food, essential items, clothing, technology and money for families to put towards increased utility and food bills, and spent many hours delivering it to children, young people and families' doorsteps around the city.





Adaptability

"The Covid-19 pandemic brought out the very best in LPW staff who managed the challenges of keeping the school open, alongside offering remote learning and outreach work with great success. We also supported families with their day to day needs including delivering over 700 food parcels, sourced items of clothing, and provided technology to support families affected by the digital divide. A quiet space amongst the grey vista... Staff and students have helped transform a dull, empty, black-tarmacodd-shaped space to a garden of colour, growth and enjoyment. Many members of the local community have also commented on the positive impact upon them, even to the point of asking some of the students if they could make some planters for them to buy.

In a year like no other our staff and students have **risen to the challenge** ensuring every young person, regardless of circumstances or background can **achieve** their potential and **progress** successfully into further education.




For the first time in the school's history we achieved a 100% pass rate in all subjects, including

record high GCSE grades and **fantastic** achievements across a wide range of vocational subjects.


With thanks to the Foundation for Children, young people had the opportunity to take part in day trips to Jamie's Farm this spring where they were able to: share farm-focussed, practical experiences that supported their communication skills; develop compassion through their interaction with animals; engage with and build relationships with their peers and adults; strengthen their sense of self, and take ownership, pride and responsibility through caring for animals.

Re-engagement and Support

Determination

As one of Britain's most vulnerable and marginalised groups our work with Gypsy and Roma Traveller (GRT) children, young people and families has always been critical, but it is even more so because of Covid-19. This vear, thanks to the Bristol Health Fund and Quartet Community Foundation, we secured funding to continue to deliver PIER - our targeted project to bring about **positive change** for GRT children and voung people across Bristol; give them voice; opportunity to participate in their wider community; and reframe society's misconceptions about their lives and cultures.



"The need for a participatory, and empowerment-focused approach to GRT youth work is imperative in addressing the inequalities experienced by CYP in these communities. LPW's commitment to the work has made a significantly positive impact on the GRT Community's relationships with wider



services (education, health, the arts and local community centres.)" Jordan Maynard, project partner and doctoral researcher at the University of Bristol.

Adaptability

"I have been involved with I PW since March of this year as my godson, who is ten years old, has not been in full time school for two years. He has very high trauma issues and trusts no-one. Especially adults. Since his engagement with two of the Engagement Workers from LPW I have seen his **behaviour transform**. He hasn't had a violent outburst since. His confidence and self-esteem has started to build. It has literally been a lifeline for both of us. His Engagement Workers are efficient and professional, and have also been fluid and accommodating in our situation and always open to **listening** and a chat!" Carer




Kindness

With thanks to The John James Foundation, Business in the Community, Gresham Tech, Raspberry Pi and LiveWest we have given out

more than 70 laptops

and Chromebooks to support children and young people who didn't have access technology to **complete school work** and **stay connected** to their friends and families during lockdowns.





Community work

Determination

In November 2020, the Government announced a package of targeted extra financial support for those in need over the winter period which included the COVID Winter Grant Scheme that was made available between



We secured **£12,600**

under the scheme which meant that, when we identified vulnerable children, young people and families that were struggling, we could **respond immediately** with **emergency funding** for them to spend on groceries, essential items, clothing, and utility bills.



"YP1, lives on his own and is struggling to meet all his own needs. He would use the grant primarily to pay for food items. This would reduce worry and distress over hunger, allow YP1 to maintain a healthy diet throughout the winter months and promote good awareness of nutrition." Engagement Worker



Adaptability

As the first national
Lockdown started in March
2020, so too did our playfocussed work **delivered in**partnership with Playful Bristol,
funded by the National

funded by the Nationa Lottery Community Fund.

To maintain our support to children and families, Playful Bristol mobilised and ensured that children still had access to varied and engaging

Resilience

From origami lessons to new hair style tutorials; slime making tutorials to making art from nature; tips on how to grow fruit and vegetables to cake recipes, our quick thinking and creative Engagement Workers pulled together hundreds of online resources and livestreams to help keep children and young people occupied, connected and happy during lockdowns.



Partnerships

The See Hear Respond (SHR) funding programme was announced by The Home Office in partnership with Barnardo's in early June 2020 to support the most vulnerable children

and young people impacted by the pandemic.

"Working alongside LPW has been such a positive experience. Mobilisation was swift, understanding of the programme was innate, and all work has been delivered with flexibility, creativity and with children and young people at the centre of their work. As part of the **Holiday Activities Fund**, we delivered

99 HAF sessions this summer alone

engaging more than 200 individual

children with 1749 contacts,

and 64 young people

with a total of 925 contacts.

Organisational developments

Determination

Central Government released Holiday Activities Funding (HAF) for children and young people eligible for free school meals during Easter, Summer and Christmas holidays in 2021. Working with Playful Bristol, we worked collaboratively to help remove barriers to accessing funding and ensured that grassroots organisations, already embedded in local communities and delivering critical play and youth work, could access the funds

available. Across

for the Easter holidays and £1.2 million for summer, all of which created opportunities for vulnerable children and young people to engage in positive play and youth activities during the school holidays.





Adaptability

We continuously look to build new ways of working with young people to improve wellbeing and reduce the risk of exclusion. By forming **secure**



positive relationships with young people, we can help young people to rebuild relationships with schools, statutory services, family, peers and their community. By working in this way we have seen young people, who have not stepped foot on a school site

re-engage for the first time in 3 years - and become regular attenders.





Resilience

We delivered specialist training to The Crown Prosecution Service and The Prince's Trust, upskilling their staff on Child Criminal Exploitation and Serious Youth Crime. "Apart from reminding me of my age and how out of touch I am, I really enjoyed that **session.** In all seriousness, it actually reminded me why we do, what we do." Partnerships

In response to feedback from children and young people LPW, Youth Moves and StreetSpace worked collaboratively to implement a secure detached offer to **improve outcomes** for children and young people in south Bristol.



'The 'one team'

approach to detached outreach in south Bristol is a good example of organisations (LPW, Youth Moves and Street Space) coming together, playing to each other's strengths, to provide a coordinated approach to supporting young people.' Quartet Community Foundation, May 2021.

Our approach has helped **shape** and inform the same approach to collaboratively co-delivery in other areas of Bristol.
